ARLIS/NY SPRING MEETING

Institute of Fine Arts, NYU Wednesday, May 1

The Spring ARLIS/NY Chapter Meeting on Wednesday, May 1 will be co-hosted by the Library and the Visual Resources Collections of the Institute of Fine Arts, New York University. ARLIS/NY has not met at the Institute since 1982, and it is hoped that both art librarians and visual resource professionals will find the meeting rewarding. The Institute is located at 1 East 78th Street, at the corner of 5th Avenue and 78th Street.

The informal get-together will begin in the Oak Room on the first floor at 6:00 pm with catered refreshments and a welcome from Professor James R. McCredie, Director of the Institute. The program itself will be introduced by a brief talk by Professor Egbert Haverkamp-Begemann, renowned Rembrandt scholar and authority on Dutch painting. Professor Haverkamp-Begemann is also a remarkable bibliophile (his office has compact shelving!) whose remarks should be entertaining as well as informative.

Following these preliminaries, attendees will be invited to visit the IFA Visual Resources Collections with curator Jenni Rodda; the Stephen Chan Library of Fine Arts with Sharon Chickanzeff and Max Marmor; and the IFA Conservation Center Library (located at 14 East 78th Street) with Robert Stacy. All three collections will remain open throughout the evening, so it should be possible to visit any or all. There will be no formal tours, but staff will be available to answer any questions visitors may have.

Because refreshments will be catered, an RSVP is requested with the number of people attending; names are unnecessary. Please call 212-772-5825 by April 19. A special invitation will be mailed to Metropolitan area members of the Visual Resources Association (VRA) in the hopes that many of our colleagues can attend.

ANNOUNCING THE 1991 ARLIS/NA CONFERENCE IN KANSAS CITY!

The 19th Annual Conference of the Art Libraries Society of North America will be held at the Ritz-Carlton Hotel in Kansas City, Missouri, from March 7-14, 1991. Over 50 invited speakers from the U.S., Canada, and Great Britain will share their expertise in a wide variety of sessions sure to be of interest to librarians of art, design, museum, slide, AV, and architectural collections.

Among the topics to be addressed at this year's conference are: funding libraries; for art museum issues for professional visual resource curators; the future of subject analysis and access in an online environment; current databases for architecture; production of the ethical durable art book; considerations of access vs. privacy; contemporary art archives; collection management systems and their impact on museum libraries; new trends in decorative arts; and cataloging of architectural drawings.

Pre-Conference workshops will be offered on Space Planning and Searching RLIN for Art Information, an updated and expanded version of a popular workshop offered at the 1990 conference.

A new feature of the 1991 meeting will be an Open Forum on Censorship Issues. ARLIS/NA's president will moderate this program offering each speaker 10 minutes at an open mike.

The conference will take place at the newly renovated Ritz-Carlton Hotel, located on the Country Club Plaza. Attendees will be able to enjoy the fashionable shops and public sculpture for which this "City of Fountains" is famous. The renowed Nelson-Atkins Museum is a short walk from the hotel and is the site for this year's convocation and opening reception. The Museum will also host a special lecture on the Henry Moore Sculpture Garden.

Conference ARLIS/NA Tours are deservedly popular. Four tours of distinctive Kansas City architecture are planned, as well as a jazz tour, a visit to the Linda Hall Library, a tour of the Art Institute, and trips to Lawrence, KS; Independence, MO; and the Thomas Hart Benton House. Fees for the Conference will be \$65 for members and \$85 for nonmembers. Rooms at the Ritz-Carlton will be available at a special rate of \$94 per night (single or double). ARLIS/NY CHAPTER MEETING

Cooper Union/Peter Cooper Suite Dec. 4, 1990 AT 6PM Ethnic Potluck

Elizabeth Vajda provided ARLIS/NY with the splendid Peter Cooper Suite where approximately 36 ARLIS/NY members laid out their remarkable delicacies, all worthy of our warmest congratulations.

Suzanna Simor began the meeting by reviewing events of the past year. She noted that last February the ARLIS/NA Conference was held in New York--supported by the volunteer work of ARLIS/NY's members, and, above all, Ross Day and Ted Goodman. April, ARLIS/NY and SLA/NY jointly sponsored the conference: "Marketing Library: Outreach, Relations", which was funded by from ARLIS/NA, grants SLA, and several corporate donors. In late June, we sponsored a walking tour of public sculpture in Battery Park City. Finally, in September we had our business meeting at The General Society of Mechanics and Tradesmen in which attending members voted

unanimously for increases in membership dues and for changes in bylaws covering membership categories and privileges.

In suggesting possible events for the coming year, Simor presented proposal from Janice Woo, of Parsons School of Design Library, to give a spring workshop on the METRO Collection Inventory Project. It be co-sponsored SLA/NY/MAHD or another professional organization, but it would focus only on Art and Architecture subjects. Suzanna Simor polled the attending members. Half were interested in such a meeting, but were evenly split in a preference for a day-time meeting over an evening meeting. Barry Redlich suggested that this proposal should be described in our next newsletter, where the question of day-time versus evening could be addressed, giving the whole membership a chance to voice their preference.

Simor also mentioned that we may wish to continue our activities with SLA/NY's Library/Information Society's Cooperative Group.

There have been efforts to revive the Professional Concerns Committee. Jeff Ross has agreed to head such a committee, but will need interested members to join him.

Ross Day chairs the committee that is to take care of the Chapter's archival material, acronym: DisCArD (Disposal of Chapter Archival Documentation). Ross Day has also completed a list of every ARLIS/NY board member and newsletter editor in the Chapter's history. This list will go into the Chapter's archives and will be regularly distributed to future nominating committees.

Eumie Imm will be replacing Hikmet Dogu as Editor of <u>ARLIS/New York News</u> beginning January 1991. Julie Melby has agreed to compile the exhibitions list. We are still looking for an Advertising Editor for the newsletter.

We now have nearly 150 members in our New York Chapter, yet our financial picture is still unsatisfactory. Simor pleaded with members to renew at the new dues rate (\$15./year or \$10./year for students and the retired), despite the old rates listed in the last newsletter.

Simor called for volunteers to help at the registration desk at the 1991 ARLIS/NA Conference in Kansas City. The Central Plains Chapter membership is not large enough to keep the desk covered all of the hours it is opened.

Simor thanked outgoing Board members: Hollee Haswell, past chair; Paula and Gabbard, secretary; Trevor Hadley, member-at-large. She also thanked Hikmet Dogu for serving so well as newsletter editor for the past couple of years. Those who will continue on the Board from last year are: Linda Seckelson, 1991 chair; Céline Palatsky, treasurer; and Kitty Chibnik, member-at-large. Simor welcomed to the board: Katie Keller, vice-chair/chair-elect; Ann Benton, secretary; and Max Marmor, member-atlarge. Simor thanked the nominating committee (Janis Ekdahl, chair, Ross Day and Ted Goodman) for providing the strong slate of candidates and for providing instructions for future nominating committees.

Suzanna Simor expressed the chapter's thanks to Elizabeth Vajda for hosting this evening's meeting at the Cooper Union, and to Linda Seckelson, the organizer of this evening's meeting.

Simor then gave the meeting over to Linda Seckelson, new ARLIS/NY Chair. Linda asked us if we would indulge her by quickly going around the room to introduce ourselves, and we did.

Janis Ekdahl announced that Sydney Keaveney's husband died on December 2 after a long illness. Our heart goes out to Sydney in these difficult times.

Ted Goodman announced that he now chairs ARLIS/NA's Wittenborn Committee, and he added that he may be contacting some of us about his charge.

The meeting was adjourned around 8:00 P.M.
